INTERNATIONAL DAY OF REMEMBRANCE OF THE VICTIMS OF SLAVERY AND

THE TRANSATLANTIC SLAVE TRADE

IN THE CITY OF HAMPTON

WHEREAS, on March 25, 2008, International Day of Remembrance of the Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade was launched by the United Nations (UN); and

WHEREAS, International Day of Remembrance of the Victims of Slavery and the Transatlantic Slave Trade was agreed upon globally as a day in commiserating the lives and deaths of millions of enslaved Africans and their descendants who were central to the rise of Britain and the United States as an industrial power; and

human rights in the history of humanity; and WHEREAS, slavery and the slave trade are among the worst violations of

WHEREAS, the transatlantic slave trade was unique within the entire history of slavery due to its duration of four hundred years, its scale of approximately 17 million people excluding those who died during transport, and the legitimization accorded to it, including under laws of the time; and

August 1619; and WHEREAS, the first Africans from the transatlantic slave trade to arrive in America, landed in present day Hampton, Virginia during the later part of

WHEREAS, on May 23, 1861, run-a-way slaves sought refuge at Fort Monroe, and became contraband of war, ending hundreds of years of slavery in Virginia; and
